English

The English Department had iPads on display, where students were able to listen to English literature inspired podcasts.

Students also enjoyed the dominions word games, which allowed them to show off their vocabulary.

Prospective students were also encouraged to explore tactile materials as they created their very own Elizabethan inspired masks.

Mathematics

Parents and students were engaged through the challenge of the jumping frog game or the multilink challenge when they entered the classroom.

The premise is that each frog can only jump the way it is facing and, frogs can only jump over frogs of the opposite colour. The goal of the puzzle is to make the frogs switch sides, in the least possible number of moves looking at different combinations. Many tried to complete the task and many failed 'it looks so simple' was said on several occasions. Students and parents enjoyed the activity and fun was had by all.







IT and Business Studies

It was a fantastic turnout for the IT and Business Studies department and it was great to see so many potential students engaging in activities with our current students.

Parents and students had the opportunity to explore the inside of a computer, with Brajan in Year 10 was in his element, as he explained the many different components that make up a computer.

COLLABORATION-Continuing to Combat Covid

We hope you and your family are safe and well. Whilst the government has relaxed restrictions, we have kept some measures in place for everyone's safety and are ready to put further measures in place, if necessary.



We must remain vigilant as a community as the Autumn term continues; the transmission rates in the six local wards to JQA are reviewed weekly, with cases in school reviewed daily. We have published an Outbreak Management Plan on our website, and we will communicate with you on a Friday, should we need to put additional measures in place for the next week.

So far, we have had to undertake no additional measures yet.

As you will see above, cases remain low locally, although there has been a spike locally in Smethwick East.

One of the biggest weapons against the spread of the virus, and its variants, is regular testing. We test at home now and students are regularly issued with lateral flow test kits. We test teach Wednesday and Sunday. Texts and app alerts act as reminders to students, and we appreciate your ongoing support with this.

Attendance Matters

All students are expected to arrive on time by 8.35am and attend school every single day.

We do not accept poor attendance, as students who are not at school are missing out on vital learning opportunities.

If your child is ill, you should call our Absence Line on 0121 729 7220 and press Option 2.

If your child is classed as 'persistently absent' (if their attendance drops below 90%) you can expect measures to be put in place to support you as a family to make sure your child's attendance improves.

We will notify you if your child's attendance is in danger of falling into this category.

We work in partnership with the Local Authority's legal team and will not hesitate to take action should your child's attendance not improve to our expected standards of 97%.

RESPECT-1 Way System

After half term, students will be moving around the Academy more as our transitional arrangements come to an end.

This will mean students being issued with new timetables and travelling around the Academy.

To support this, we will be introducing a 'oneway system' over the holidays so we can manage the flow of students.

We will be sharing the details of this with students in an extended form time from 9.35— 11.25 on Monday 1st November. **Students should arrive at the Academy between 9.15 and 9.35 on that day so staff can prepare their new rooms.**



Tutorials, practice with their tutor and a video will support students to navigate around the Academy and senior and pastoral staff will be on hand to support this.

Students Visiting The Toilet in Lesson Times

students with medical needs will be given a pass in their planner to use the toilet during lesson times should they need to.

They will visit Student Reception where they will show this pass in their planner. ONLY these students will be authorised to leave a lesson to use the toilet.

Students have been given extra time at break and lunch this year and must get used to getting into routines to use the facilities at these times. Too much learning time is being lost. There are too many students this half term, for example, who have visited the toilet immediately after lunch - when they have had 45 minutes to use the facilities! Students should visit the toilet before school at 8.15-8.35, just as they would if going on a journey.

RESPECT-The Halo Code

Hair discrimination remains a source of racial injustice with serious consequences for Black people in the UK. The Halo Collective is a group that aims to challenge this.

Despite hair being a protected racial characteristic under the law, there is a widely held belief that Black hairstyles are not suited for formal settings, and may be unhygienic, messy, disruptive, or unkempt. These ideas strike at the freedom and dignity of Black people and serve no purpose other than to instil shame. Together, we will ensure that all Black people can learn, work, and live free from hair discrimination.

The Code:

'Our Academy champions the right of staff and students to embrace all Afro-hairstyles. We acknowledge that Afro-textured hair is an important part of our Black staff and students' racial, ethnic, cultural, and religious identities, and requires specific styling for hair health and maintenance.

We welcome Afro-textured hair worn in all styles including, but not limited to, afros, locs, twists, braids, cornrows, fades, or hair straightened through the application of heat or chemicals.'

At JQA, we recognise and celebrate our staff and students' identities. We are a community built on an ethos of equality and respect where hair texture and style have no bearing on anyone's ability to succeed.







RESPECT-World Food Day

Students did activities and learnt about World Food Day this week. World Food Day is celebrated every year worldwide on 16 October to commemorate the date of the founding of the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization in 1945. The day is celebrated widely by many other organizations concerned with hunger and food security, including the World Food Programme (WFP) and the International Fund for Agricultural Development. WFP received the Nobel Prize in Peace for 2020 for their efforts to combat hunger, contribute to peace in conflict areas, and for playing a leading role in stopping the use of hunger in the form of a weapon for war and conflict.

150 countries around the world observe this day to generate more awareness about people suffering from hunger and to encourage actions to ensure food security for all.

Some Key facts from World Food Day:

1. Approximately 1/3 of all food produced worldwide, about £750 billion around the world is wasted.

2. According to a joint report by the World Health Organization (WHO), the World Bank and the UNICEF the wasting prevalence in 2017 was estimated at almost 8 percent across the globe.

3. One in eight people in the world today are undernourished while 1.9 billion people in the world are overweight.

4. Though India is gifted with enough agricultural lands and resources and also produces enough food, yet the food does not reach so many hungry women and children in the rural villages and remote corners of India. India ranks 100th among 119 countries in the Global Hunger Index (GHI) 2017, and it has been consistently ranked very poorly.

5. As per United Nations 820 million people suffer from hunger and 155 million children are chronically malnourished.

CORE EDUCATION

EXCELLENCE AT JQA-Drama

Year 10 have been researching Verbatim Theatre and focusing on a play which explores the dangers of Drink Driving and the lasting effects this can have on someone. As part of their course in Performing Arts researching is key to understanding how a play goes from 'page to stage'. Year 10 were able to apply the Verbatim techniques they have learnt to a scene from Too Much Punch for Judy. As well as Verbatim, they used Physical Theatre and symbolism to present this stylised scene. They have also shown excellent research skills on the background of the play creative intentions. Analysing why certain skills were chosen to portray this real-life event. Well Done Year 10!







EXCELLENCE AT JQA-Music

Within music, Year 7 students have been studying world music, within their lessons they have composed African music performances using percussion instruments, learned how to play a chaal rhythm and composed body percussion performances. They have also sung 'Three Little Birds' by Bob Marley and 'Don't Worry Be Happy' by Bobby McFerrin.

Year 8 students have been studying film music and have been analysing scenes from different films. They have focused on developing emotion using different musical techniques such as diegetic and non-diegetic music. Students have analysed the music of John Williams and Hans Zimmer and are now moving onto developing their own compositions using percussion, keyboards and body percussion for specific scenes including The Lion King and The Dark Knight.

Year 9 students have been studying song writing techniques especially focusing on the techniques pioneered by David Bowie. They have used newspapers to create original compositions and they have worked on developing themes within popular music.

Year 10 students have started their coursework for the BTEC Level 1/ Level 2 TECH award in Music Practice. Students have studied the music of the 1960's analysing the British Invasion and Rock music. They have been learning varying melodies on the keyboard and have made impressive progress in only 5 weeks. Students will be learning about new decade of music each week.

Year 11 have been continuing with their coursework for the BTEC Level 1 and 2 First Award in Music. Students have been holding meetings to organise a Christmas concert. Within this unit students are creating promotional material, organising auditions, and learning the processes involved in putting on a live event. Year 11 students have also been practicing their instruments at home and have started to create a rehearsal log, writing smart targets, and analysing their performance skills, ready to perform for the class in 4 weeks' time. This will be the first opportunity that the year 11 students have had to perform for the class in over a year. I look forward to seeing their performances. The students are also working on their Unit

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EXCELLENCE AT JQA-Science

Here is an excellent example of Higher Tier work in our GCSE Combined Science lessons in Year 11. Students were studying Oxidation and Reduction reactions, which are used to extract metals, but also demonstrate the principle of displacement-where a more reactive substance transfers electrons to a less reactive substance to form a new compound; while the less reactive substance is reduced to a simple atom, becoming chemically stable. Students were required to represent this in the form of lost/gained electrons, as well identify the compound/elemental ions that did not change; known as spectator ions. They then simplified this equation to represent only the oxidised (lost electrons/more reactive) substance, and the reduced (gained electrons/less reactive) substance. This topic is usually aimed at students aiming for Grades 7-9 and is one of the topics that bridges the gap between GCSE study and A-Level Chemistry.
